

Angels, Barony of the

Ælfgar leoðcraeftig. New name.

[Name] No preferences are indicated. The name was submitted as *Ælfgar leoðcraeftig*

Ælfgar is found in the on line Studies on Uncompounded Personal Names in Old English, Mats Redin, inaugural dissertation, 1919, pg 59. In the entry *Aeffa*, "The name of *Aeffa*'s son, *Ælfgar* may indicate that the Anglo-Saxons of c. 1000 knew that *Aeffa* contained the theme *Aelf*."

Ælfgar is also found on the PASE site <http://www.pase.ac.uk/pase/apps/persons/index.html> as a male given name, **Ælfgar** for 72 individuals

Since the submitter indicated in an email to the submitting herald that he wanted **Ælfgar** but the forms list the name **Aelfgar**, we have changed his submission to the preferred spelling.

Caid, Kingdom of

Golden Lance of Caid, Order of the. Resub Laurel Order Name.

[Name] Registered 02/75

This order name was returned on June 2009 LoAR for conflict with Order of Golden Lance of Ansteorra, and Order of Golden Lance of Trimaris.

This resubmission is accompanied by a copy of the treaty given permission to conflict.

Order name is approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Calafia, Barony of

Dvora Iador. Resub Laurel Device. *Purple, a nightshade flower and on a chief argent 3 nightshade flowers purple.*

[Name] Registered March 2009.

[Armory] Previous submission *Per pale gules and Or, a seeblatt counterchanged* was returned March 2009.

Precedent says:

...there is no CD for type between a heart and a seeblatt, leaving just the single CD. [Grietje Crynes, LoAR 09/2004, Northshield-R]

Therefore, this device is in conflict with the device of Achmed of the Hill Tribes, *Per pale gules and Or, a heart between two scimitars addorsed all counterchanged*, with a single CD for the removal of the scimitars. It is also

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a conflict with the device of Ginevra Solario, *Per pale gules and Or, five hearts in saltire counterchanged*, with a single CD for changing the number of charges.

It is not a conflict with the device of Sciath nic an Leagha, *Per pale gules and Or, a heart charged with another heart, a bordure counterchanged*, reblazoned elsewhere on this letter. There is a CD for the addition of the tertiary heart and a CD for the removal of the bordure.

This is a complete redesign of her returned submission.

The submitter would prefer to blazon the flowers as nightshade. Nightshade has been registered 2 times, the most recent being 1997.

Azure, on a bend between two horse's heads couped argent a deadly nightshade vine vert flowered purple. (Anne of Flaming Gryphon, 07/91, the Middle):

Argent vêtue gules, a deadly nightshade eradicated vert flowered purple. (Corwin Cromwell, 03/97, the Middle).

Nightshade is found in Europe North Africa and Western Asia and is also known by the name belladonna

Culpeper: from his *English Physitian* (1652): ‘The leaves are good for cooling hot inflammations in the eyes, or other parts of the body, and, being boiled in oil and used as a foment, it will assuage all manner of swellings, either in the scrotum, women’s breasts, and other parts of the body; also the gout, sciatica, and pains of the joints, if proceeding from a hot cause... The oil of the seed is good for deafness, and noise and worms in the ears.’

Notes: It is a poisonous plant and one should still follow Culpeper in not taking it internally. A source of hyoscyamine or scopolamine, an atropinic alkaloid, that is sedative and has the other properties of atropine, namely hallucinations, tachycardia, dry mouth and agitation when taken in excess. It tastes awful so poisoning is uncommon.

Unfortunately, this conflicts with: *Purple a rose argent slipped and leaved vert, on a chief argent three mullets pierced sable.* (Ber skytja, 02/05). We are suggesting the submitter consider reversing all tinctures, but have not checked this combination.

Device returned for conflict.

Eva de Castille. Resub Kingdom device. *Per pale gules and sable, in pall three seablatter argent points outward.* [Name] Registered 01/09.

[Armory] The previous submission, *Per pale gules and sable, three seablatter argent* was returned by kingdom July 2009 for conflict with (Angharad Caprioli Amante, 12/96).

This new design gives one CD for the field and one for the orientation of the primary charges.

Device is approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Konrad Faust Tyndell. Resub Kingdom Name.

[Name] Original submission 03/09. This submission has been returned several times for lack of clarity in the actual name desired by the submitter. That has been rectified with this submission.

The submitter desires a masculine name, and cares most about the sound Tyndell. The submitter allows minor changes, but not major changes, except for those listed below.

His second choice is Konrad Faustus Tyndell, with the third choice being **Conrad Faust Tyndell** and the fourth Conrad Faustus Tyndell.

Konrad is a common German given name, cited 67 times during 1451-1500 and 121 times during 1501-1550, found on Late Period German Masculine Given Names by Talan Gwynek (Brian M. Scott)

Faust is a German epithet *vust* (1270) and later a surname (16th century magician Georg Faust) meaning "fist", The same magician went by Faustus (Latin given name).

"The history of the name <Faustus> is slightly complex. The German name derives originally from an older form of the word <Faust> 'fist'. It is recorded as an epithet as early as 1270, <Wessel mit der vust> "Wessel with the fist". The best-known bearer of the name is the 16th century magician Georg Faust. He also styled himself <Faustus>, making a play on the Latin word <faustus> "lucky" [3]. Much earlier in history, the Latin word itself was used as the basis for a name; there were several early Saints Faustinus and a 5th century Saint Faustus [4]. However, these names did not remain in use in Germany into the Middle Ages. <Faustus> did not come back into use as a given name until the 19th century [6]."

Tyndell is found in Commissariat Record of Edinburgh, Register of Testaments, Part 1 Volume 1-35-1514-1600 as a surname dated to 1580 "Agnes, sometimes spouse to William Douglas, of the Badds, par of Bathgate". Also Andro 1577, Cuthbert-1594 etc.

Also found as a locative surname undated in R&W pg 448 under Tindal. meaning from the valley or river of Tyne. Dated spellings include de Tindal 1165 P (Nb); Roger Tindale 1332 SRCu; John Tyndall 1395 Whitby (Y).

Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Ulric de Exeforde New Badge *Argent, on a bend engrailed sable, three horseshoes argent.*

[Name] Registered 11/09

[Device] Horseshoes are by default open end downward.

Badge is approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Dreiburgen, Barony of

Susanna Scholastica Feyr Seibold von Gettendorf. New Name and New Device. *Purple, a dragon rampant Or on a chief gules fimbriated a cross of St. James between two crosses fleury argent.*

[Name] The submitter desires a feminine name, will accept minor but not major changes. She cares most about the spelling of Feyr Seibold and the language/culture German.

Susanna is found in Aryanhwy merch Catmael's "German Names from 1495"

Scholastica is a saint: St. Scholastica whose Feastday is February 10, 543 St. Scholastica, sister of St. Benedict, consecrated her life to God from her earliest youth http://www.catholic.org/saints/saint.php?saint_id=240

Fehr is found in Bahlow p 116, Header. UGer-Swiss means ferryman, Common in Zurich, where there was a journeyman of the sailors's guild by the name of Feer in 1468. Also MHG vere: hence Fehr(mann) also in the (North Sea) coastal area, as well as Fehre, Getzold Fere, dtd 1390.

Seibold is found in Bahlow p 468 (UGer) = Sibold:Gisgald (bald, 'bold'); sh.f. Seibel, Beible. Also Seipold, Patri Seibolter (Aust.), Seubold, Seubel are Franc. Also related is the pl.n. Seibelsdorf in Bav.

von – generic 'of' in German.

Gettendorf is found in German Place Names from a 16th C Czech Register: Modern to medieval index by Aryanhwy merch Catmael at <http://www.ellipsis.cx/~liana/names/german/modernperiod.html>

The name is returned for lack of documentation for pattern <given name><given name><surname><surmane><locative> in German.

[Armory] Fimbriation is allowed only on central charges. Also, the Cross of St. James and the crosses fleury are variants of the same cross. This device is returned for these style issues and on resubmission, the emblazon should not be colored using colored pencil.

Name is returned for lack of documentation.

Device is returned for fimbriation of a chief and the use of two versions of the same charge (sword and dagger).

Gyldenholt, Barony of

Jorundr korpr Ormsson. New Name and New Device. *Per pale gules and argent, a falcon's head erased sable.*

[Name] Submitter desires a masculine name, will accept all changes, and cares most about the language/culture (unspecified),

[Name] All elements are from Geirr Bassi.

Jorundr is found in Geirr Bassi on p. 12

korpr is found in Geirr Bassi on p.

Ormr is found in Geirr Bassi on p. 13, the patronymic is formed based on discussion in Geirr Bassi.

[Armory] This conflicts with *Barry of eight and per pale Or and gules, an eagle's head erased sable*. (Holtmar of Wyrhtenatun, 08/1981, Meridies), There is a single CD for changes to the field. It also conflicts with *Per pall potency Or, ermine and azure, in chief a raven's head erased sable*. (Brennus of Hawkwood, 10/83, Atlantia), There is a CD for changes to the field but nothing for the placement of the head as Brennus's raven's head is forced to chief.

Name is forwarded to Laurel.

Device is returned for conflict.

Isles, Shire of

Christian von dem Eiland. Resub Kingdom name and Resub kingdom device. *Sable, on a pale azure fimbriated and endorsed three crosses formy argent.*

[Name] The submitter doesn't care about the gender of the name. Submitter allows minor changes and cares most about sound (unspecified).

From original submission returned Aug 08

[Name] The submitter desires a masculine name and requests changes to be authentic for "14-15th Cent. German (Bavaria)". He will accept minor, though not major changes, and if changes must be made, he cares most about the meaning "of Isles".

Christian is listed in "Late Period German Masculine Given Names" by Talan Gwynek (<http://heraldry.sca.org/heraldry/laurel/names/germmasc.html>). It was recorded in 15th C. Plauen. Also, Cristianus is cited as a German given name in "German Given Names 1200-1250" by Talan Gwynek. (<http://heraldry.sca.org/heraldry/laurel/names/germ13.html>).

von Eiland is intended to mean "of the Isles". The submitter provided no documentation supporting this. The formation is not grammatical. "Von" is used with specific placenames, rather than generic toponomic words. We made an unsuccessful attempt to find a period town called "Eiland". Likewise, Bahlow does not list any bynames based on the word "Eiland."

According to "Cassell's New German and English Dictionary" by Karl Breul, "das Eiland" is the "poetic" word meaning "island". It is found on p. 300 in the English to German section of the book. It is not found in the German to English section. The plural form would be "Eilandes", and so, as a byname, might be encountered as "vom den Eilandes" (from the Islands) or perhaps "Eilandesmann/Eilandmann" (man from the Islands/man from an Island). The German to English section lists "Insel" (plural: Inseln) with definition "island". This word might produce the bynames "vom den Inseln" (from the Islands) or perhaps "Inselmann/Inselmann" (man from the Islands/man from an Island). Finally, Bahlow (p.270) lists an undated byname, "Inselmann," with the meaning "from Insel near Soltau or Stendal", which may or may not be derived from the submitter's desired meaning. If the place can be found in period, another plausible byname would be "von Insel". A modern-day Insel is found in Sachsen-Anhalt, though we have not yet found evidence this place existed in period.

So, in the end, we must return this for lack of documentation of the byname construction. While the submitter requests (minor) changes to make the name authentic, all of the possible alternatives we have come up with would be too dissimilar to the submitted spelling.

[Armory] This conflicts with *Sable, on a pale azure fimbriated a Latin cross bottony argent* (Karl inn Kristni, 05/06) with only one CD for cumulative changes to the tertiary charge group.

Name is returned for lack of documentation, and device is returned for conflict.

Christian is listed in "Late Period German Masculine Given Names" by Talan Gwynek (<http://heraldry.sca.org/heraldry/laurel/names/germmasc.html>). It was recorded in 15th C. Plauen. Also, Cristianus is cited as a German given name in "German Given Names 1200-1250" by Talan Gwynek. (<http://heraldry.sca.org/heraldry/laurel/names/germ13.html>)

von dem Eiland- Epithet "from the island" in German translated with Google <http://translate.google.com/#de|en|Eiland>. Crescent believes this is a valid, generic locative, but would request assistance from the college for any additional documentation.

Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Device forwarded to Laurel.

Nordwache, Barony of

Tiberius Bibulos. New Name and New Device. *Per chevron gules and argent, three mullets one and two and a*

decreascent counterchanged.

[Name] The submitter is interested in a masculine name. He will accept minor but not major changes. He request authenticity for an unspecified language/culture and if the name must be changed he cares most about the meaning (Latin, "drunkard"). We note that the form was changed before submission.

Tiberius is the name of a Roman tribune (133bc) *Tiberius Sempronius Gracchus*, found in the online Britannica <http://www.britannica.com/EBchecked/topic/240427/Tiberius-Sempronius-Gracchus>. *Tiberius* is also found as a praenomen in "Names and Naming Practices of Regal and Republican Rome - Praenomen and Nomen" by Meradudd Cethin (<http://heraldry.sca.org/laurel/names/roman/names.html>).

Bibulus is the name of a Roman politician, consul with Julius Caesar in 59bc, found in the on line Britannica at <http://www.britannica.com/EBchecked/topic/64612/Marcus-Calpurnius-Bibulus>.

The name is returned for lack of documentation of the form <praenomen><cognomen>. Dolphin will check with Ursula and the submitter.

[Armory] The device is returned for the use of a restricted charge, a gules decreascent on an argent field. On resubmission, the lower portion of the field needs to be larger and the crescent should be drawn in a more standard manner.

Name returned for lack of documentation.

Device returned for use of a restricted charge.

Wintermist, Shire of

A'isha al-Raqqasah New Name Change

[Name] **Ceridwen Luned of the Fen** registered September 1991. Registered name is to be retained as alternate. The submitter desires a feminine name, cares most about the meaning (unspecified), and will accept all changes.

A'isha is found as a feminine ism in 'Period Arabic Names and Naming Practices' by Da'ud ibn Auda, at <http://heraldry.sca.org/laurel/names/arabic-naming2.htm>

al-Raqqasah - feminine occupational nisba meaning "the dancer." In Academy of St. Gabriel Letter #3373 Printout of Academy of St. Gabriel paper included with submission.

The occupational nisba <al-Raqqas.ah> is found in an Arabic language document from a collection of documents about the Jewish community in Cairo between the 10th-12th centuries. (Here the period after the s represents a dot under the previous letter, indicating an emphatic consonant.) It is pronounced \ar-rah-QAAH-sah\, where the \Q\ is a sound not found in English, similar to a \K\ but further back in the mouth. Instead of making contact with the soft palate, the back of the tongue makes contact with the uvula. The \AAH\ is like \AH\ but longer in duration.

Although the modern meaning is 'the dancer,' in your time period <al-Raqqas.ah> may have meant 'the errand girl' [Goitein, Shelomo Dov, *A Mediterranean Society: The Jewish Communities of the Arab World as Portrayed in the Documents of the Cairo Geniza* (San Francisco: UC Press, 1967), vol. 1, p. 431, n. 19.].

Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Aonghus Lyndesay. Laurel Resub Device. *Checky argent and sable, on a pale vert an eagle argent.*

[Name] Registered 06/06.

[Armory] His previous submission, *Vert, an eagle argent and a sinister tierce checky sable and argent*, was returned by Laurel on the June 2006 LoAR for conflict with *Vert, a chimney swift migrant palewise argent*. [*Chaetura pelagica*] (John of Ean Airgead, called the Mad Celt 10/79)

Device approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Kristofer Olafsson New Badge (*Fieldless*) *A mullet of four points within and conjoined to an annulet azure.*

[Name] Registered 09/96.

Badge approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Lucian Galenus. Kingdom Resub Device. *Per pale sable and gules, a turtle fesswise sinister Or.*

[Name] Appears on Caid's January 31, 2010 LoI.

[Armory] His previous submission, *Per pale sable and gules, a turtle Or*, was returned at the January 17, 2010 meeting for conflict with *Sable, a leatherback turtle tergiant displayed Or*, (Helmer Marcellus du Corbier, 04/73). There is only one Clear Difference, for change in tincture of the field.

This submission conflicts with (*Fieldless*) *A turtle tergiant fesswise contourny Or* (Michel von Schönsee 09/05, Atlantia).

Device returned for conflict.

Lucian Galenus. Kingdom Resub Device. *Per pale sable and gules, a turtle fesswise Or.*

[Name] Appears on Caid's January 31, 2010 LoI.

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[Armory] His previous submission *Per pale sable and gules, a turtle fesswise sinister Or.* is returned for conflict, above.

Device approved and forward to Laurel.

Martin FitzJames. New Badge. (*Fieldless*) *A fleece sable, ringed and banded argent.*

[Name] Registered 01/00.

[Armory] This conflicts with *Erminois, a fleece sable* (Gwendolyn Anne the Obscure, 08/94). There is a CD for fieldlessness but nothing for changing the tincture of the ring and band.

Badge returned for conflict.

Martin FitzJames. Kingdom Resub Badge. (*Fieldless*) *A fleece gules, ringed and banded argent.*

[Name] Registered 01/00.

[Armory] His previous submission, (*Fieldless*), *A fleece sable, ringed and banded argent* was returned for conflict, above.

Badge approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Móirín Chiardhubh ní Bhárdáin. New Badge. (*Fieldless*), *A fleece argent.*

[Name] Registered 01/97.

Badge approved and forwarded to Laurel.
