

Minutes of the March 20, 2011 College of Heraldry Meeting

Meeting commenced at 11:45 AM.

In attendance were: Su *Crescent*, *Illuminada Dolphin*, *Hrorek Chevron*, Thomas *Quatrefoil*, *Jeanne Marie Noir Licorne*, *Ursula Green Staff*, *Cormac Seraph*, *Damien Sable Fret*, *Eridana Trident*, *Magdalyn Tynkere*, and *Dubhghall mac Aodha mhic Néill*.

Upcoming meetings are: April 10 (Roadshow at Collegium), and May 15.

LoAR – The January LoAR CL and decisions were discussed.

Hrorek notes that the Crown Prints announcement about Collegium is incorrect; the NMS is \$5 not \$3 as stated.

Unless otherwise noted, all submitters will accept the creation of a holding name, if appropriate. Approved submissions will be forwarded on the April 30, 2011 Letter of Intent.

Alianora MacMahan~ New Name

The submitter cares most about the sound (unspecified); no other preferences are indicated. The submitter desires the same spelling as Gabriel M' Machan of Silverhall, submitted below. Submitted as Alianora Macmahon, the name was changed to Alianora MacMahan to match Gabriel's byname.

Alianora is found in *Feminine Given Names in A Dictionary of English Surnames Part Two: The Names A-G Talan Gwynek* at <http://heraldry.sca.org/laurel/reaneyAG.html> under the heading **Eleanor** < Provençal *Aliénor*, a form of **Ellen**. [Ellenor] dated to 1428 (W)

MacMahon is justified by *Ursula Green Staff*:

Mari ingen Briain meic Donnchada's article "16th & 17th Century Anglicized Irish Surnames from Woulfe"

(http://www.medievalscotland.org/kmo/Woulfe/SortedByGaelicRoot_M1.shtml) lists <O Mahan> as a sixteenth- or seventeenth-century Anglicized form of the Irish byname <Ó Mac.áin>. The same article gives examples of <Mac> followed by an anglicized Irish root without a space: <MacAnthony>, <MacGillafyndeane>, and <MacMajoke>. Thus, <MacMahan> is a plausible Anglicized Irish name, corresponding to a hypothetical Gaelic <mac Mac.áin>.

Name approved as changed and forwarded to Laurel.

Aneirin ap Alwyn ~ New Name

The submitter desires a masculine name, cares most about the language/culture (unspecified) and will accept minor, but not major changes.

Aneirin is found in "Name and Naming Practices in the Meironeth La Subsidy Roll 1292-3 p. 96.

ap – 'son of'

Alwyn is found in Withycombe 3rd ed. p. 17

By precedent, ap can be used with English names:

Found on the LoI as Myfanwy ferch Gerallt, it was originally submitted as Myfanwy ap Gerald, and changed in kingdom because it was felt that the use of ap or ferch needed a Welsh name. However, late period Welsh used ap and ferch with English names, so we have restored the patronymic to the originally submitted form. (LoAR November 1998, p. 4).

This precedent was reaffirmed in registering Rhiannon verch Bryan in 1/2008.

Dreiburgen

Name approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Aneirin ap Alwyn ~ New Device *Azure, in pale three bezants in chevron and a sheaf of arrows argent within a bordure embattled Or.*

This is returned for a redraw: there are too many embattlements on the bordure, the bezants are not clearly in chevron, and the arrangement blurs the distinction between a primary charge and a secondary charge group and a single primary charge group.

Device returned for redraw.

Caid, Kingdom of ~ New Badge *Azure, in saltire two throwing axes and in chief four crescents conjoined in cross points outward within a bordure embattled argent.*

Branch name was registered 02/75.

This badge is intended for the thrown weapons award.

Badge approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Cateline Calais ~ New Name

The submitter desires a feminine name and cares most about the sound (unspecified).

Cateline IGI Parish records (extracted records)

CATELINE CAVE – IGI Gender: Female Christening: 08 SEP 1622 Walloon Or Strangers Church, Canterbury, Kent, England

CATELINE DENTIERE – IGI Gender: Female Christening: 24 NOV 1605 Threadneedle Street French Huguenot, London, London, England

CATELINE JOUELIN – IGI Gender: Female Christening: 04 OCT 1646 Threadneedle Street French Huguenot, London, London, England

CATELINE LE CLERCQ – IGI Gender: Female Christening: 16 JUL 1629 Threadneedle Street French Huguenot, London, London, England

Calais is a city in northern France mentioned in Froissart, for example, "...les seigneurs de France a aller a Calais..." ("...the lords of France went to Calais..."), found in Antwerp M 15.5, fol. 333r (http://www.hrionline.ac.uk/onlinefroissart/browsey.jsp?AbsDiv=ms.f.transc.Ant-2&AbsPb=Ant-2_333r&ter ms=calais).

Bardsley, s.n. Callis has <de Calays>, dated 1379.

Calais also found in the extracted IGI Parish records as an unmarked locative

JOHANNES CALAIS – IGI Gender: Male Christening: 12 MAY 1622 Saint Kew, Cornwall, England

MARY CALAIS – IGI Gender: Female Christening: 15 APR 1632 Saint Mary The Virgin, Dover, Kent, England

This conflicts with Catherine de Calais, registered December 1996 via Ansteorra. Per precedent Caitlin conflicts with Katharine (Katharine Stuart, Nov. 2001).

Name returned for conflict.

Cateline Calais New Device *Argent, in cross two lozenges vert and an crescent and decrescent azure.*

Device returned for lack of name.

Christian von Dresden ~ Resub L Name, Change of Holding Name

Christian of the Isles was registered as a holding name 06/10.

The submitted desires a masculine name. If the name must be changed he cares most about the language/culture (15th C German).

Christian is listed in "Late Period German Masculine Given Names" by Talan Gwynek (<http://heraldry.sca.org/heraldry/laurel/names/germmasc.html>). It was recorded in 15th C (1401-1450), Plauen. Also, Cristianus is found once as a German given name in "German Given Names 1200-1250" by Talen Gwynek. (<http://heraldry.sca.org/heraldry/laurel/names/germ13.html>) Dresden is found in Blau's Atlas Maior on the map of Misnia on p. 98 which shows Dresden in this spelling.

Isles

Name approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Cixilio Martinez ~ New Name

No preferences are indicated.

Cixilio is found as a feminine given name found in "Feminine Names from the 10th Century Catalonia" by Colm Dubh, KWHSS Proceedings 2009.

Martinez is found in Diez Melcon. Section 136, p. 133 under Martinus: "Roderico Martinez" 1027. It is also is found in "Spanish Names from the Late 15th Century" by Julia Smith (Juliana de Luna), at <http://heraldry.sca.org/laurel/names/isabella/patronymic.html> which cites Martinez to the late 15th century as a patronymic surname.

Denys Calais ~ New Name

Submitter cares most about sound and wants a female name

Denys is found in English Names found in Brass Enscriptions by Julian Goodwyn at <http://heraldry.sca.org/laurel/names/brasses/women.html> with 2 instances in 1539 in Middlesex.

Calais as an unmarked locative found in the extracted IGI Parish records

7. CHARLES CALAIS – IGI Gender: Male Christening: 27 FEB 1641 Saint Mary The Virgin, Dover, Kent, England

12. JOHANNES CALAIS – IGI Gender: Male Christening: 12 MAY 1622 Saint Kew, Cornwall, England

Name approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Drust Thorirsson- New Name.

No preferences

Drust is a Pictish given name found on St Gabriel report 1209 as the given name of multiple Pictish kings. "The name <Drust> or <Drest> was fairly common in a list of Pictish kings from circa 500-1000. It would be an excellent Pictish names."

Thorir is a male given name in Geirr Bassi. The patronymic is formed in accordance with the rules on p. 17 of Geirr Bassi.

There is no precedent on the registration of the combination of Pict and Norse names, we believe this to be at most a step from period practice.

Name approved and forward to Laurel.

Drust Thorirsson ~ New Device *Per fess sable and argent a tree eradicated counterchanged.* Conflict with *Per fess sable and argent, a tree, blasted and eradicated between in chief a decrescent and an increscent counterchanged*, (Mathieu Sylverwoode of Nyte Haven 06/86).

There is a single CD for removing the secondary crescents.

There is no difference between a tree and a tree blasted (Atia Alexandri uxor, Jan 2011).

Per precedent re tree blasted and eradicated vs. tree eradicated: [Argent, an oak tree eradicated proper and on a chief gules three crosses of Toulouse Or]... Given the information provided by Dame Gwenllian, this depiction of an oak tree is registerable. However, it conflicts with Rosamund du Grasse, *Argent, a willow tree blasted and eradicated, on a chief gules two geese close respectant argent*. There is not a CD for changes to the tree, leaving a single CD for changes to the tertiary charges on the chief. (Guilheumes de Garrigis, 10/05).

Dubhghall mac Aodha mhic Néill ~ New Badge *Argent, three mascles conjoined in pale sable, within each mascle a pellet.*

Submitter's name was registered January 2011.

Elric Godwine ~ New Name

No preferences are indicated.

Elric is found as a masculine given name in Keats-Rohan, *Domesday Names*, p. 72, which lists Elric, Elrici, and Elricus. R&W, pp. 5-6, s.n. Aldrich, dates *Elric* to 1066.

Godwine is found in R&W pg 195 under heading Godwin. From the OE personal name Godwine, from god 'god' or göd 'good' and wine 'friend, protector, lord', which survived the conquest. Walter **Godwin**' 1177 P (Nf), various other spellings are listed.

Name approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Enedina Lacarra de Navarre- New Name

Submitter has marked no boxes.

Enedina- Submitter said the name was from St Gabriel, and although the college was able to find this on several "baby name" site, we were unable to find anything there or elsewhere acceptable.

Lacarra is the submitter's legal surname as attested by Trident and Avenel Kellogg

Name returned for lack of documentation for the given name.

Etain O Crowley ~ Resub L Name

The submitter desires a feminine name, cares most about the sound and language/culture. She desires a name authentic for 14th century Irish.

From the 08/06 LoAR Laurel suggested "Etain O Crowley is a registerable, but not authentic form of this name. This form mixes Gaelic and English which is one SFPP." Despite the fact that this name is not authentic it is registerable per the prior return, therefore we are forwarding it as suggested and submitted.

Name approved and forward to Laurel.

Feilan stjarna ~ New Name

Submitted as Felian Stjarna, we have made the byname lower case in accordance with current precedent. Submitter is a female and is aware this is a masculine name. The submitter doesn't care about the gender of the name, no other preferences were indicated.

Feilan is found in St Gabriel Report 1512 which suggests that in the 12 & 13 century:

Faol is the Gaelic word for "wolf."

The second possibility is <Fa/ela/n> (early period) or <Faola/n> (late period), pronounced [FAY-lahn]. It is a diminutive of the word <fa/el> "wolf", so it would have been recognized as related to its root

word in the same way as the modern name <Wolfie> [2, 3]. <Fa/ela/n> would be a particularly good choice for the persona you want because we know how it could have been adapted into Old Norse. A character in the Laxdaela saga is named <O/la/fr feilan Thorsteins son raudha> "Olaf Feilan, son of Thorstein the Red". In this name, <feilan> is a borrowing of the Irish

<fa/ela/n> [4].

Putting it all together, we're pretty confident that a Scottish Gael named Fa/ela/n who was living in Norse society could have been known as <Feilan skotr> or <Feilan inn skozki>, both meaning "Feilan the Scot".

stjarna is an epithet byname meaning star found in Geirr Bassi p. 28

Feilan stjarna ~ New device- *Purpure, a wolf's head erased between three oak leaves argent.*

Device approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Finnbarr Ua Lochlainn ~ New Name

The submitter will accept major, but not minor changes. No other preferences are indicated.

Finnbarr is a masculine Irish name born by eight saints, found in OCM p. 101. It is also found in "Index of Names in Irish Annals" by Mari Elspeth nic Bryan (<http://medievalscotland.org/kmo/AnnalsIndex/Masculine/Finnbarr.shtml>) as the Old Irish Gaelic and Middle Irish Gaelic nominative spelling of name.

Ua is the Irish indicator of 'descendant of'.

Lochlainn is found as a masculine Irish name meaning probably 'Viking.' "The name came into use in the early middle ages among the Ui Neill of the north and others" Woulfe. p. 190 indicates the genitive is the same as the nominative.

It is also found in "Index of Names in Irish Annals" by Mari Elspeth nic Bryan (<http://medievalscotland.org/kmo/AnnalsIndex/Masculine/Lochlainn.shtml>) as the Middle Irish Gaelic and Early Modern Gaelic nominative and genitive spelling of the name.

Name approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Finnbarr Ua Lochlainn ~ New Device *Purpure, a wyvern erect, wings displayed, argent, flaunches Or scaly sable.*

The name on the armory form was changed to match the submitted name.

Device approved and forward to Laurel.

Florie Seaborn ~ New Name

The submitter desires a feminine name and cares most about the sound (unspecified).

Florie is found as a Scottish feminine given name in Black, s.n. Quintin (p. 678) dating to 1190-1220. <Florie> is dated to 1567 in Talan Gwynek, "A List of Feminine Personal Names Found in Scottish Records", <http://heraldry.sca.org/laurel/names/scottishfem.html>.

Seaborn is found in R&W (s.n. Seaborn, p. 397) derives several similar surnames from the OE Saebeorn; it is undated in the submitted spelling but Seborn is dated 1190, Saberon is dated 1377. Bardsley cites the surname Seiborne to 1581 (s.n. Seaborn, p. 674).

John Thomas Gilbert, Historic and municipal documents of Ireland, A.D. 1172-1320 (<http://books.google.com/books?id=jvwKAAAAYAAJ&pg=PA10#v=onepage&q&f=false>) lists <Rodbertus filius **Seaborn**> as the name of an Anglo-Norman man in Ireland from the time of Henry II. This shows that <Seaborn> is available as a medieval given name, so <Florie Seaborn> is possible, using <Seaborn> as an unmarked patronymic.

Scots + English names are registerable, without a step from period practice (Weirdness Table, re: Michael Duncan of Hadley, 04/04). Name elements separated by more than 300 years are a step from period practice ("there is a weirdness for elements dated between 300 and 1000 years apart. Elements that are dated more than 1000 years apart are not registerable, due to the significant temporal disparity." [Sáerlaith an Einigh, November 2002 LoAR, A-Æthelmearc].) Thus, this name has one step from period practice.

Name approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Florie Seaborn ~ New Device *Argent, a fleur-de-lys vert issuant from a base wavy azure.*

The submitter desires canting arms on the name Florie Seaborn.

Device approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Gabriel MacMahan of Silverhall ~ RESUB Kingdom Name-

Changes to the given name were made prior to submission. Submitted as Macmahan the name was changed to MacMahan to match the documentation.

Originally submitted as Gabriel MacMahan in June of 2010 and was withdrawn because of multiple documentation problems.

Submitter cares most about sound "Macman," will allow any spelling change and also allows Silverhall to be dropped if necessary for registration.

Gabriel is found in "English Names found in Brass Enscriptions" by Julian Goodwyn with 1 occurrence in Surrey dated to 1512 <http://heraldry.sca.org/laurel/names/brasses/men.html>. It is also found once in 1599 in this spelling, Gabriel, and one time in the spelling Gabriell in 1584 in "Masculine Given Names in Chesham, 1538-1600/1" by Mari ingen Briain meic Donnchada at <http://www.medievalscotland.org/kmo/Chesham/masculine.shtml>. We have changed the submitted spelling to the documented form with the least differences.

MacMahon is justified by Ursula *Green Staff*:

Mari ingen Briain meic Donnchada's article "16th & 17th Century Anglicized Irish Surnames from Woulfe"

(http://www.medievalscotland.org/kmo/Woulfe/SortedByGaelicRoot_M1.shtml) lists <O Mahan> as a sixteenth- or seventeenth-century Anglicized form of the Irish byname <Ó Mac.áin>. The same article gives examples of <Mac> followed by an anglicized Irish root without a space: <MacAnthony>, <MacGillafyndeane>, and <MacMajoke>. Thus, <MacMahan> is a plausible Anglicized Irish name, corresponding to a hypothetical Gaelic <mac Mac.áin>.

Silverhall is a constructed locative based on the period bynames color+hall.

Numerous examples of color+hall are found in R&W.

Blackhaill R&W pg 47 Robert **de Blackehall**, 1221 & Ralph **de Blackhale**, 1332 - dweller by the black nook

Browhaill- R&W pg 68 header Brownel- Alan de Brunhale 1275 and Adam Bronhulle 1441- dweller by the brown hill or corner of land

Whitehall R&W pg 487 William de Withalgh, 1332 & Gilbert del Whithalgh 1397 and James Quhithall, 1585 meaning dweller by the white nook or hall

Silver - The use of **silver** as a color can be found in The Compact OED [p. 2826, sn Silver] (definition 6, given as "a silvery colour or lustre" is dated to 1481, citing Caxton's Reynard xxxii, (Arb.) 85: Wherin stode somme strange hystories whiche were of gold, of sable, of siluer.

Juliana Neuneker Hirsch von Schutzhundheim ~ New Name Change

Registered name Julianna Neuneker Hirsch von Schutzhundheim, 06/92.

Submitter desires the spelling Juliana (with only one 'n').

Juliana is found with a single 'n' 13 times in "German Names from 1495" by Aryanhwy merch Catmael (Sara L. Uckelman), <http://www.ellipsis.cx/~liana/names/german/german1495.html>.

If this is registered, her previous name is to be released.

Name change is approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Juliana Neuneker Hirsch von Schutzhundheim and Arion Hirsch von Schutzhundheim ~ Kingdom Resub Household Name **Company of Saint Martin de Tours**

Name change submitted with this household name: Juliana Neuneker Hirsch von

Schutzhundheim. Changed to be held by joint owners at the submitter's verbal request to

Crescent.

The submitter cares most about the meaning (unspecified).

The use of Saints names in Fraternal Knightly Organizations is cited in Medieval Secular Order Names: Fraternal Knightly Organizations by Juliana de Luna, http://medievalscotland.org/jes/OrderNames/Fraternal_Knightly_Organizations.shtml. Included are: Saint George, Saint Christopher, Saint George of Rougement, Saint Georges and Saint Williams Shields, Saint Georges Shield, Saint Hubert, Saint Sebastian, Saint Simplicius, Saint William, and Saint Williams Shield.

The 'company of Saint George,' 'the noble company of the Gold(en) Fleece,' the Knights of the Company of the Holy Spirit of Right Desire,' 'Company called of the ship' 'Company of the star' 'the company of knightly society of the Blessed Mary of the Noble House at Saint Ouen near Saint Denis in France' and 'the company of the spool' are cited in Medieval Secular Order Names: Courtly Orders and Awards by Juliana de Luna at http://medievalscotland.org/jes/OrderNames/Courtly_Orders_and_Awards.shtml.

The Courtly Orders and Awards section of the same article (http://heraldry.sca.org/laurel/names/order/new/Courtly_Orders_and_Awards.html) includes Fraternitas S. Martini (c. 1496-7), St. Martins Bruderschaft (c. 1496-7), and gesellschaft St. Martins (1497). Adding the locative clears this submission from the cited Brotherhood of Saint Martin.

Household Name approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Juliana Neuneker Hirsch von Schutzhundheim and Arion Hirsch von Schutzhundheim ~
Laurel Resub Badge *Azure, two scarpes argent within a bordure argent.*

This badge is intended for the household: Company of Saint Martin de Tours, submitted this month. Changed to be held by joint owners at the submitter's verbal request to *Crescent*.

Leon Pendragon ~ New Name

Submitter allows all changes including adding de, or of, or atte to clear presumption

Leon is found in Withycombe, s.n. Leo, as a masculine given name dated to 1213-5 and 1306.

Pendragon is a placename found in Ekwall pg 361 in this spelling the name of the castle in 1314.

Ancient precedent holds: "Pendragon is not a surname but a title, Chief of the Dragon (i.e., Wales). Even without the Red Dragon it would be unacceptable. (KFW, 11 Aug 77 [14], p. 7)" disallows Pendragon as a surname. More recent precedent states:

This name is tantamount to a claim to be Ygraine, wife of Uther, Pendragon, and mother of Arthur. Pendragon is not a surname, but a title meaning "Chief of the Dragon;" the name Draco is a form of and means Dragon. We note that the grammar of the byname is in the nominative form when it should be in the genitive (possessive) form. The correct form is uxor Draconis.

We note that while a name of the form "Ygraine, wife of Dragon" is presumptuous, a name of the form "Ygraine, daughter of non-Arthurian-name, wife of Dragon" should be registerable. We suggest that she finds a patronymic unrelated to Arthurian literature and add that to her name. " [Ygraine uxor Draco, 07/04]

We are forwarding this submission and request that these precedents be overturned allowing Pendragon to be registered as a locative surname as long as there is no allusion to the ancient kings of Wales (particularly Uther or Arthur).

Letitia Fannyng ~ New name

Submitter desires a feminine name and allows only minor changes.

Letitia is found in "Feminine Given Names in from Kent, 1302-1363" by AElfwyn aet Gyrwum at <http://www.s-gabriel.org/names/aelfwyn/kentfemnames.html> which cites

Leticia, Letticia, Letitia 1344-45, 1349-50, 1356-57, 1361-62, 1362-63.

Fannyng is found in R&W pg 162 Fanning- Thomas Fannyng 1405.

Name approved and forwarded to Laurel.

Letitia Fannyng ~ New device *Per pale gules and argent, a peacock contourny within a bordure semy-de-lys counterchanged.*

Device approved and forward to Laurel.

Lorentz Monne Klingelkatz ~ New Name

The submitter doesn't care about the gender. No other preferences are indicated.

Lorentz is a masculine given name found in Bahlow/Gentry 2nd ed. Dictionary of German Names p. 310. It is the header spelling, and is undated. Lorentz is also found in Aryanhwy merch Catmael, "German Names from Nürnberg, 1497"

(<http://heraldry.sca.org/names/german/nurnberg1497.html>) as a masculine given name.

Monne is a variation of Mohn, Mohns found in Bahlow/Gentry 2nd ed. Dictionary of German Names p. 333 (s.n. Mohn); it is undated. Brechenmacher (s.n. Mon(e), p. 280) dates Mone to 1350.

Klingelkatz is a constructed name. Klingelfu[sz][sz] and Klingelhut are found in Bahlow/Gentry in reference to a fop or dandy (Aargau 1424, Breisgau 1318) on p, 271.

without a space: <MacAnthony>, <MacGillafyndeane>, and <MacMajoke>. Thus, <MacMorris> is a plausible Anglicized Irish name, corresponding to a hypothetical Gaelic <mac

Muirg.is>. There's a character named Captain MacMorris in Shakespeare's Henry V. This
